


# **Mission Bulletin**

# <u>Union is Strength - Lauren Jones, MDS, Kirkcaldy: Torbain and Templehall</u>

Covid has been a tricky time for churches everywhere, with the extended shutdown of in-person worship and seeing our halls and outreach activities

come to a stop. Since December 2019 I have been working at Torbain parish church as a locally funded Go For It grant pilot, for 10 hours a week doing community outreach.

In March 2020 things were starting to get busy – I had secured over £10,000 of funding for a lunch club and community fridge, and started a successful Messy Play class, linking in to the local nursery school, which was run at cost to help everyone access it no matter their financial position. By the end of March everything had ground to a halt and I had pivoted to primarily phoning elderly and vulnerable members of our congregation, and posting things online. Hardly the best outreach programme, but the best we could do under the circumstances. Torbain took its services online, and surprisingly we found we had people from across the world tuning in on a Sunday morning to watch and worship with us.

In October, with things gradually opening back up, a local health visitor brought it to our attention that diagnoses of Post Natal Depression were 50% higher than the year before, thought to be due to lockdown. We were able, with the help of some very willing volunteers, to start up a Wee Wriggler club, where mums of babies under 1 could come and make new friends, have a (hot) coffee, and just generally have a chat and a listening ear. That first class, open to 10 people, was filled within an hour of promoting it on facebook. By the end of December when those classes sadly had to come to an end due to lockdown restrictions tightening, we had three classes of 10 mums running each week, and a waiting list of 32 mums!

The unification of Templehall and Torbain churches has created a new opportunity – I've now been employed by the Church of Scotland as a Ministries Development Staff (MDS) worker, working for 3.5 days a week. The churches will come together officially on 24th February, via a Presbytery Zoom service. If someone had told me this time last year we would be conducting our Presbytery services over Zoom, I would have laughed!

We are continuing contact with our Wee Wrigglers mums via phone, Zoom and social media, and under the guidelines we are able to go for outdoor walks with up to 6 of them at a time, which we commence next week (hopefully it will be a bit warmer than this week!). Members from both churches have been incredibly supportive of me in my new role, and everyone has such fantastic ideas for outreach we can be doing in the future, which we've started planning for already. Although church unions can often be difficult, the Union between Templehall and Torbain is a blessing and an opportunity and it's clear that by working together we can achieve so much more than the churches could separately. - *Lauren Jones, MDS* 

Please keep the congregations of Templehall and Torbain in your prayers, as they prepare for their forthcoming union, that it brings strength and renewal to their church reinvigorating them for mission across their community.

The purpose of these online gatherings is to provide an opportunity to connect with others serving in children, youth and family ministry, in order to share ideas and support one another as we seek to develop this area of ministry in these challenging times.

In recent months, so much of our ministry has been affected and changed as a result of COVID restrictions. Many things have stopped or had to be done in different ways. This has resulted in some losses but also created some new opportunities. That said, the context that we are serving in has had its challenges for a while now and, as expressed in the quotes below, we need to think radically about how we might better serve our children and young people now and in the future.

'In many of our churches, children, young people and young adults are missing and the vast majority of adults in our population have not been introduced to church or faith as children.' The Church of Scotland Radical Action Plan 2018

'This is a fulcrum moment for the church - we can either pivot back to what we were once before and continue a cycle of decline, or we can take what we have learnt during lockdown and return to our ancient ways of being together, all ages with and for one another.' D Philip 2020



#### **DramaKirk: Easter 2021**

For Easter, Drama Kirk is producing an engaging way to share the Easter story with Primary School-aged children, a series of five poems from Bob Hartman's "Rhyming Bible". Together, they tell the Easter story in an accessible way. We will perform the following:-

**Waiting in Line** – This poem introduces Jesus and lets us hear about various things he has done – and how wants to see children!

## **Funding**

### **The Community & Third Sector Recovery Programme**

The Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO)'s Community & Third Sector Recovery programme aims to support charities (including churches, community groups, social enterprises and voluntary organisations) that are supporting people and communities through the shift from lockdown to recovery. As well as providing ongoing crisis support, they will be planning and implementing changes to adapt and thrive in a very different social and economic climate.

The programme is currently open and has two strands: Adapt & Thrive and Community Recovery Fund.

In the simplest terms, Adapt & Thrive is capacity building to help organisations adapt, change, and thrive post-COVID-19. The Communities Recovery Fund is grant funding to deliver support and services in communities.

Money for Adapt & Thrive has to be allocated by the end of March but can be used for up to 12 months thereafter. No match funding required and grants range from between £5K and £75K.

#### Aviva Grants of up to £50,000

Available for Community Projects (UK) Aviva has launched the next round of its Community Fund. Aviva has teamed up with the fundraising platform Crowdfunder to offer funding of up to £50,000 to small charities, schools and community interest groups in the UK with innovative ideas that benefit their community. Every three months from January 2020 onwards, £250,000 will be split equally among Aviva's UK employees to donate to the projects that matter to them most. #### **Funding to Create Resilient Rural Communities**

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for projects from across the UK which are working to create resilient rural communities. The Prince's Countryside Fund will award funding from the Barclays 100x100 UK Covid-19 Community Relief Fund to support farming and rural communities to cope with the impact of Covid-19, to expand on new services that have emerged to support the local community during this time and to build future resilience. Applications are encouraged from community-led organisations with a turnover under £500,000 per year, from communities with a population of up to 3,000 residents. Examples could Include rolling out longer term food and medicine delivery services; social groups to support isolated people; or mental health support. The Fund will close when enough eligible applications have been received.

#### **Funding for Community Based Projects**

The Hilden Charitable Fund awards grants of an average of £5,000 to causes working at community level in the UK and developing countries which are less likely to be able to raise funds from other sources. Current UK funding priorities are: • Homelessness, • Penal Affairs, • Asylum Seekers and Refugees, • Community-Based initiatives for Disadvantaged Young People Aged 16 to 25. Overseas, Hilden concentrates on projects in developing countries working on community development, education, and health and particularly welcomes those that address the needs and potential of girls and women. Only applications submitted on the form supplied on the website will be considered. Hilden accepts applications at any time but the closing date for applications to be considered at the next meeting of Trustees is the 16th April 2021.

#### **Grants to Help Older People Lead More Fulfilling Lives**

Barchester's Charitable Foundation is a grant giving charity that helps older people and other adults with a disability across England, Scotland & Wales to lead more fulfilled lives and reach their full potential. The Foundation's focus is on connecting or re-connecting people with others in their local community, helping combat isolation and loneliness and enabling people to be active and engaged. Funding of

between £100 and £5,000 is available for individuals and small community groups to help improve people's mobility, independence and quality of life. Individual applications must be completed by a third-party sponsor such as a health care professional, social worker or charity/support group representative. Applications are assessed on a case-by-case basis, with funds allocated to those who demonstrate greatest need.

#### **People's Postcode Trust Opens for Applications**

The People's Postcode Trust has re-opened its grants programme and will award grants on a monthly basis until October 2021. Funded by players of the People's Postcode Lottery, the Trust makes grants to support smaller charities and good causes in Scotland under the following themes: • Improving mental wellbeing • Enabling community participation in the arts • Preventing or reducing the impact of poverty • Supporting marginalised groups and promoting equality • Improving biodiversity & green spaces • Enabling participation in physical activity • Responding to the climate emergency & promoting sustainability • Increasing community access to outdoor space Registered charities can apply for grants of up to £20,000, other not for profit organisations can apply for grants of up to £2,000 to support both project and organisation core costs. The funding is available for 12 months. To be eligible to apply, organisations will need to have an annual income of below £1 million with preference given to those with an income of below £500,000 per year. The Postcode Community Trust will operate on a monthly basis. On around the 1st of each month, applications will open, and organisations will be able to submit their request for funding until the maximum number of 150 has been received until the 1st October 2021.

#### **AllChurches Trust**

AllChurches Trust like to fund projects that demonstrate an impact on people and communities. Applicants should include clear (and where possible, measurable) outcomes for projects and demonstrate how they will ensure sustainability beyond our funding. It's also important to show how additional funding support will be sought to enable the project to be completed.

Our open grants normally fund capital projects and equipment, not salaries or running costs, with the exception of our transformational and Hope Beyond programmes. In most cases, we give a small percentage of the project cost as this enables us to say yes to more worthwhile causes, although we do occasionally give larger grants.

#### **National Church Trust**

Funding available for Scotland's cash strapped churches and chapels

A range of grants are available from the National Churches Trust

Churches and chapels in Scotland needing funding for urgent repairs and maintenance are being encouraged to apply for grants from the National Churches Trust.

In 2021, the church support charity expects to allocate more than £1.5m to churches and chapels throughout the UK. Any church, chapel or meeting house in Scotland that is open for regular public worship can apply.
