Talk by Plastic Free Dunfermline - 19 May 2021

We welcomed Pete Hogg and Zora Tamas to FIG and they started by stating that they were volunteers not experts in this subject. They were concerned about the plastic being used around the world and wanted to make a difference. Plastic-Free Dunfermline is a small group about 6 committee members dedicated to change people's habits. The Group works with businesses and demonstrates how to reduce the use of plastic. . Their motto is Refuse Reduce Reuse Recycle. Instead of using plastic use alternatives. Every step in the production of plastic disperses pollution and some leakage at each stage. The group is proud as Dunfermline received the Plastic-Free Communities award from Surfers Against Sewage. Just think of all the plastic we use in the home especially the kitchen and bathroom and try to reduce these items by buying refills or items in wood or another recyclable material. It is never easy to change and take up new ways. Cost can be a factor when obtaining the alternatives but when you realize that only 9% of plastic is recycled then we can understand the problem we have on our hands. Each year the problem gets bigger and bigger. 73% of litter on the beaches is plastic, 1.1 million animals and birds are killed by plastic annually, and scientists reckon that most people ingest 70K of micro plastics annually.

9th Annual Interfaith Lecture 2020

Talk by Sarah Keeble – Founder of S.H.I.E.L.D Sarah Keeble only recently moved to Fife and as the pandemic began to bite, she saw a great need for people who had been affected by the pandemic and built up an organization which has helped thousands over the last two years. Mainly in Food but also in other ways; obtaining household items for those in needs, providing help to those people who were struggling. Sarah stressed that she could not have done this without the many volunteers who have helped her so much. S.H.I.E.L.D started in West Fife and is now doing great work in Central Fife as well. Sarah summed up " "I just can't wait to move forward. People are asked to help and when they do it really lifts them. We try to enable someone to have a sense of self-worth as all of us have gifts to share with each other".

Anne Marie Smith - NHS Mental Health:

This was a very interesting talk telling of the ways that NHS Fife is working to improve people's mental health especially as there has been a rise because of lockdown and people being very lonely. She talked about self-help by ensuring people look after themselves but she also emphasised that services are there to help. Ask for help from professionals, the Samaritans and look for Fife Health Promotions which will have a page to help.
