

However, there is one thing people do agree on - the status quo is not an option.

So we need to face this ever changing and uncertain future with a new sense of vision. It will not be easy, and Bennochy church will not be immune to the changes that will inevitably take place. In the world of faith, it has ever been so. The future obscures our vision. Questions remain unanswered, yet, ancient words speak of faith and hope.

(I read it in a book by Gervase Phinn.)

He was born in an obscure village. He worked in a carpenter's shop until he was thirty. He then became an itinerant preacher. He never taught a lesson in a classroom. He had no tools to work with, such as blackboards, maps or charts. He used no subject guidelines, kept no records, gave no grades and his only text was ancient and well-worn. His students were the poor, the lame, the outcast, the deaf and the blind. The content of his method was the same for all who came to hear him and to learn from him. He opened eyes with his faith, he opened hearts with love, a love born of forgiveness. A gentle man, a humble man, he asked for and he won no honours, no gold awards of merit to his expertise and wisdom. He never held an office. He never had a family or owned a house. He didn't go to college. He had no credentials but himself.

He was only thirty three when the public turned against him. His friends ran away. He was turned over to his enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying his executioners gambled over his clothing, the only property he had on earth.

All the armies that have ever marched, all the navies that have ever sailed, all the parliaments that have ever sat and all the monarchs that have ever reigned have not affected the life of man as much as he. For this quiet teacher from the hills of Galilee has fed the needs, fulfilled the hopes and changed the lives of many millions. For what he taught brought heaven to earth and revealed God's heart to mankind.
