# 'From the 'Manse',

We are moving into a decisive period of what is known as the Presbytery Mission Plan. This is where every Presbytery has to decide on a new plan for the next five years. The plan is based on three things - the number of ministries the church can afford, how churches will come together, and finally, and probably the most challenging, how many buildings does the church need to keep. The draft plan is to come to Fife Presbytery at its June meeting. I think it is true to say that there is still a lot of work to be done between now and June.

Up to this point, there has been cluster group meetings of churches from across the Presbytery, including a Kirkcaldy cluster group, and then later on, a Kirkcaldy town centre group. From these discussions, some initial proposals will come to Kirk Sessions.

Kirk Sessions will then discuss these and submit their response to Presbytery by the middle of March. These responses will feed into the presbytery group, tasked with drawing up the new mission plan. It is important to say at this point that it is the presbytery that will ultimately decide, but it wants Kirk Sessions to be able to *influence* their thinking. We are asking people to be patient, as we work through this process, but once the Kirk Session has had the chance to look at any initial proposals, the congregation will be informed.

What makes this process different from before is its emphasis on Mission. In other words, it is not just about numbers or money, but what is the best structure for the church of today and the



future, in seeking to present the Good News of Jesus Christ. Think of it like a jigsaw. How do we create a team ministry, in a wider, viable congregation, with buildings in the right place and fit for purpose? As in any jigsaw, all pieces are required to complete the picture.

It is not going to be easy. There will be about 25% less ordained ministers, and some buildings will need to close. But this change is not just about today. It is actually about tomorrow, and the future viability of the church. One consequence means we will have to ask more of church members and those associated with the church.

It means we will have to prioritise, and some of the things the church has done for generations will need to stop. It also means the church will need new leadership, for a new age. I believe that is one of the keys to unlocking the potential of the church.

To use an image from the epic tale of the Exodus - are we captive to our traditions of the past, and so fail to move at all? Do we journey in the midst of a desert place, following the promise of God? Desert places are uncomfortable, and there are often more questions than there are answers. I suspect, it is a place we don't want to be.

Faith has ever been so. God's people have been here before. I read this recently, hope is believing despite the evidence and then changing the evidence. That is where we are at the moment, facing an uncertain, unknown, but hopeful future. As best I can, I will of course keep you up to date with what is happening and any decisions made.

But for the moment. Please stay connected. Stay safe. Till the next time.

# Letter to all Ministers and Congregations in Fife Presbytery

#### Fife Presbytery Mission Plan Update - 31st January 2022

In the King James Version of the Bible, Proverbs 29:18 says: "Where there is no vision, the people perish...." In the RSV it is translated: "Where there is no prophecy..." while in the NIV it reads: "Where there is no revelation, the people cast off restraint." By the 31st December 2022 we as a Presbytery are mandated to deliver an approved Presbytery Mission Plan that will reduce our number of ministries by approx. 25% and determine the future of our buildings. To do so, we all need to seek God's guidance and to pray for revelation, prophecy and vision.

For several months we have been in consultation and now, given the time constraints, we need to begin to forge a vision for the future. There is an ancient proverb that says: "Blessed is he who plants trees under whose shade he will never sit." It is understandable that some ministers, ministry staff and congregations are apprehensive about the future and what will happen to their church and ministry. Many have continued to work hard to maintain the church for generations to come. Our people are devoted, committed, hardworking and faithful but now we are asking too much from too few. As a new Presbytery we have come together but we don't really know one another and what we can become. We have yet to discover that we can be greater than the sum of our parts. In some places congregations are dwindling; ageing and fearful about where the Kirk is going.

Elsewhere there are new shoots beginning to appear and new ways of being and doing church beginning to emerge and evolve. Many of our ministers are weary and Kirk Sessions are working hard to support them, sustain the faithful, our buildings and our Presbyterian heritage. We all want the Church of Scotland to be living and active in our community and to endure; despite the fact that our resources are being stretched and our infrastructure may no longer be as fit for purpose as it once was. Deep

down we know we need to change, to make decisions and plan to future proof our church, so that future generations will sit in the shade of the tree that we have had the courage and the conviction to plant.

Our people are valued and we need to retain the faithful. We as a Presbytery have come together to support one another, to help one another as followers of Jesus and to be a force for good and a catalyst for change across our communities. We need to deliver on our promise to unburden ministers, elders and congregations and to free them up for mission, vitality and growth. We need to be prayerful and open to God speaking as we listen to him and seek his will as we continue to evolve, change and deliver the plan. Our aim is to enable ministers and congregations to fulfil their calling and to realise mission that is sustainable.

Lastly, in thanking you for all that you have done and continue to do for our church, we would ask you to pray for us, as together we seek to discern God's will for Fife Presbytery's Mission Plan.

#### Zambia

The Church of Scotland at present has 3 Mission Partners in Zambia: Keith & Ida Waddell continue in the fields of education, and for those with special needs, also Gina Oliver as Health Secretary. The Church of Scotland also has 3 Mission partners in Malawi.

Jenny Featherstone served long and well as Mission Partner, funded both by the Church of Scotland and the Methodist Union. Her first Newsletter, September 2007, came from Kitwe in the north, where, in the Mindolo Ecumenical Foundation, she taught Social Work and related subjects, assisting women's leadership programmes, and young people on the training farm programme with life skills and business skills.

Her first Newsletter from Choma in the south, July 2013, as Head of Chodart Training centre. Courses offered were

IT six month course @£183

Tailoring one year course @ £250

Carpentry one year course@ £300 all with a view to future employment.

Further news was of a one year contract - June 2019-2020 for community work involving Counselling, Liason among the Deacons and denominations, Alcohol abuse, Play4All, Credit Union.

She now oversees these projects independently. Such a role is the touchstone for many in need as we have recently experienced with the family of Grace and surely will continue to do so.

There is no longer the post of Mission Partner correspondent, so I step down as such. Hopefully a new team will take on responsibility for on-going fundraising and support in future and we, as a congregation, will continue to play our part in World Mission.


